FROM THE EAST



Consider the work of the operative Mason, in the construction of every edifice. Consider the tools of the operative Mason, ensuring his walls are straight, his floor level, the corners of the building square, and the structure smooth and having an appealing appearance. And underlying all of this is the science of Geometry, one of the seven Liberal Arts. In early education,

the seven Liberal Arts were a fundamental part of higher education.

Geometry? The word often strikes fear and a defensive reaction to many. We remember high school geometry – axioms, theorems, proofs, and perhaps having to go to the board and solve a problem identifying each step in the proof and citing the axiom, theorem or previous proof. Yes, this is the world of Euclidian geometry. The world of a flat plate. And it is a reasonable geometry, as it often proves items in the world in which we live. One of the proofs often required was that given a line, with a point on that line, and a second line perpendicular to the first. If the second line intersected the first at the given point, only one line could be perpendicular at that point. Consider two roads: you come to an intersection, where the second road is perpendicular to the one you are traveling on. Only one road can intersect your road at a 900 angle.

Opinions are often like the road we travel. Other opinions may differ from ours, and we often consider them to be at a 90 degree angle to ours. And, we discount other opinions, since only one can be 90 degree to ours. Right? So says Euclidian geometry.

But Einstein said the only true geometry is Lobachevski geometry; three-dimensional geometry. It is Lobachevski geometry that provides us with space travel and orbits, with a flight from New York to Oslo, Norway via the North Pole. It is also Lobachevski geometry that requires us to think is terms other than a flat surface. Consider a room; the base of one wall is a line. A second wall intersects the first at a 90 degree angle. In Euclidian geometry, we would stop, but we also have the wall rising to the ceiling, and this is a third line perpendicular to the other two. Now, we have a third perpendicular at a point (the corner of the room). In fact, Lobachevski said there are infinite perpendiculars to a given line at a given point.

And so it is with our opinions. We may not all agree with one opinion, but we can all express our opinions on a given point. In Freemasonry, geometry provides us with a valuable lesson and still provides the necessary foundation for everyone to express themselves, in a brotherly fashion.

I recently read a story that demonstrates the "equality among members" of Freemasonry. This story was related by Theodore Roosevelt, the twenty-sixth President of the United States. Afterward, Brother Roosevelt spoke of the experience of seeing his own gardener serving as Master of the Lodge that evening while he sat on the sidelines. Clearly, I could not call upon him when I came home, it would have embarrassed him. Neither could he, without embarrassment, call on me. In the lodge it was different. He was over me, though I was president, and it was good for him, and good for me. "In Masonry, all the trappings of status of prestige worn in the outside world are left on the other side of the door of the lodge --- even for presidents"
